466 Works, CDC Spring 2021 Updates:

We have been very busy collaborating with our community neighbors, businesses, the city of South Bend, & other partners. In 2020, we built 4 new houses and have four new neighbors. We will close on 2 additional houses: 1 the week of April 12, 1 in June. We have the funding and plans to build 5 more houses over the next 12 months. That will result in 11 houses: 13 since the beginning. Our agreement with the South Bend Community School Corporation to build one of their houses in the neighborhood is still viable. We have been working with an IUSB sociology intern, Knef King. He is working on a Mapping Project. This project will lay out in colors and shapes the step-by-step details of the template 466 Works uses from the beginning to the end of a project. We are proud of our hard work and we want to make sure members in the future do not have to re-invent the wheel. We are working on a similar internship relationship with Ivy Tech students. We look forward to next steps of housing rehabilitation while continuing to build new houses. Please feel free to contact any 466 Works members with any questions. 

UNITED WAY NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER UPDATE

United Way, along with community partners, is building a new neighborhood center that will serve as a model in the fields of education, youth and community development. The Southeast Neighborhood Center will be built on the corner of Fellows and Dubail, on a total of 5 empty lots which have been donated to the United Way by 466 Works (3) and the City of South Bend (2). One side of the building will host an affordable, high-quality childcare program for 112 children ages Infant-Preschool, as well as before and after school programming for school-aged children up to age 12. The other side will offer various youth, family and senior programming. The building will be open throughout most hours of the day, most days of the week, including a multipurpose room, various meeting spaces, café area and playground.



We are so excited to have a safe, warm and welcoming place, with lots of different things to do, available to anyone in the neighborhood and surrounding community.

Like most of our community, we experienced construction delays because of the pandemic. Even so, we are thrilled to share that the project is on track to break ground in June 2021, with the goal of being open to the public by Fall 2022. Our confirmed partners, who will offer onsite services include: Bowen Center, Head Start, Logan Center, REAL Services, St. Joseph County Public Library and Healthy U R.X. Pharmacy. We're still growing this list of partners, so please stay tuned for more updates as we get closer to opening.

United Way has intentionally asked for your feedback throughout the Southeast Neighborhood Center development—and we are so grateful to those of you that shared your voice. We wouldn't be where we are today if it weren't for partners like SOAR, 466 Works and Mt. Carmel Missionary Baptist Church. We continue to be humbled by your partnership—thank you for trusting us to bring this exciting new project to your neighborhood!

Southeast Neighborhood Infrastructure Project

This project is the second phase of a rehabilitation project for a large sewer serving combined sewer area 18. The first phase extended from the Ewing and Michigan intersection to Dubail and High intersection; this work was completed in 2018. This second phase includes similar work: sewer and manhole rehabilitation of the brick sewer which is 72-inches (6 feet) in diameter. This method of rehabilitation impacts neighborhoods less than open excavation or trenching projects and extends the service life of infrastructure while reducing groundwater infiltration into the sewer. The rehabilitation method used is cured-in-place pipe, which consists of inserting a "liner sock" into the sewer, filling the sock with water until it cures, and then releasing the cured water into the downstream sewer. To perform the work, pumps and hoses/pipes are setup to bypass the flow in the sewers around the work area to allow contractors to perform the rehabilitation. The bypass extends from the ball fields south of Studebaker School then crosses several streets extending in the north direction to Lincolnway. The rehabilitation is planned to be complete by April 2021 with surface restorations and bypass equipment removals complete by May 2021. The City's Contractor is Inland Water Pollution Control also known as IPR. The contractor utilizes subcontractors to assist in performing work such as traffic control signage, manhole restorations, paving, sewer cleaning, sewer video inspection, and bypass management. Rehabilitation of sewers of this size is a huge feat, and the City understands the impact to the community during construction is less than ideal and we appreciate the SOAR Neighborhood's patience with the contractor and the city during this time.

SOAR honored at Neighborhoods United Summit

At the Neighborhoods United Summit in October 2020, SOAR was presented the Neighborhood Association of the Year Award 2020. Sponsored by the Neighborhood Resources Connection, the Summit brought community leaders from all over South Bend to discuss issues facing our city and its neighborhoods that can be worked on cooperatively.

In honoring SOAR, NRC noted the many ways in which SOAR has collaborated with others in improving our neighborhood, developed a sense of community, sponsored various neighborhood activities and continued to meet and work through the pandemic.

In addition to this award, the Faithful Service Award was given to Conrad Damian, SOAR president for his many years of community service.
